Shingrix[®] Herpes Zoster Vaccine Patient Group Direction (PGD)

This PGD is for the administration of Shingrix[®] Herpes Zoster Vaccine (recombinant, adjuvanted), for the prevention of herpes zoster ('zoster' or shingles) and herpes zoster-related post-herpetic neuralgia (PHN), to individuals who are eligible for the national shingles immunisation programme but for whom Zostavax[®], shingles (herpes zoster, live) vaccine, is clinically contraindicated.

This PGD is for the administration of Shingrix[®] Herpes Zoster Vaccine (recombinant, adjuvanted) by registered healthcare practitioners identified in [Section 3](#), subject to any limitations to authorisation detailed in [Section 2](#).

Public Health England has developed this PGD to facilitate the delivery of publicly funded immunisation in line with national recommendations.

Those using this PGD must ensure that it is organisationally authorised and signed in Section 2 by an appropriate authorising person, relating to the class of person by whom the product is to be supplied, in accordance with Human Medicines Regulations 2012 (HMR2012)¹. **The PGD is not legal or valid without signed authorisation in accordance with [HMR2012 Schedule 16 Part 2](#).**

Authorising organisations must not alter, amend or add to the clinical content of this document (sections 4, 5 and 6); such action will invalidate the clinical sign-off with which it is provided. In addition, authorising organisations must not alter section 3 'Characteristics of staff'. Only sections 2 and 7 can be amended within the designated editable fields provided.

Operation of this PGD is the responsibility of commissioners and service providers. The final authorised copy of this PGD should be kept by the authorising organisation completing Section 2 for 8 years after the PGD expires as the PGD relates to adults only. Provider organisations adopting authorised versions of this PGD should also retain copies for 8 years.

Individual practitioners must be authorised by name, under the current version of this PGD before working according to it.





<p>Continued training requirements</p>	<p>Practitioners must ensure they are up to date with relevant issues and clinical skills relating to immunisation and management of anaphylaxis, with evidence of appropriate Continued Professional Development (CPD).</p> <p>Practitioners should be constantly alert to any subsequent recommendations from Public Health England and/or NHS England and NHS Improvement and other sources of medicines information. Note: The most current national recommendations should be followed but a Patient Specific Direction (PSD) may be required to administer the vaccine in line with updated recommendations that are outside the criteria specified in this PGD.</p>

4. Clinical condition or situation to which this PGD applies

<p>Clinical condition or situation to which this PGD applies</p>	<p>Shingrix® Herpes Zoster Vaccine (recombinant, adjuvanted) is indicated for the prevention of herpes zoster ('zoster' or shingles) and herpes zoster-related post-herpetic neuralgia (PHN) and this PGD applies to its administration to adults who are eligible for the national shingles immunisation programme but for whom Zostavax®, shingles (herpes zoster, live) vaccine is clinically contraindicated because of immunosuppression, in accordance with the recommendations given in Chapter 28a of Immunisation Against Infectious Disease: 'The Green Book'.</p>
<p>Criteria for inclusion</p>	<div style="border: 1px solid black; padding: 5px; margin-bottom: 10px;"> <p>Individuals should first be assessed for eligibility for vaccination with Zostavax® in accordance with the national shingles immunisation programme (see PHE Zostavax PGD).</p> </div> <p>Individuals for whom Zostavax®, shingles (herpes zoster, live) vaccine is clinically contraindicated because of immunosuppression and who:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • are aged 70 years (routine cohort) • have existing eligibility for shingles vaccination under the national immunisation programme but remain unimmunised. Individuals from 70 years of age remain eligible to commence shingles immunisation until their 80th birthday.²
<p>Criteria for exclusion³</p>	<p>Individuals for whom no valid consent has been received</p> <p>Individuals who:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • are under 70 years of age • are 80 years of age or over, except those who have received a partial course of Shingrix®² • do not have clinical contraindications to receiving Zostavax®, shingles (herpes zoster, live) vaccine⁴ • have had a confirmed anaphylactic reaction to a previous dose of varicella vaccine or to any component of the vaccine • are suffering from acute severe febrile illness (the presence of a minor infection is not a contraindication for immunisation) • have shingles infection with active lesions • are pregnant
<p>Cautions including any relevant action to be taken</p>	<p>The immunogenicity of the vaccine could be reduced in immunosuppressed subjects. Vaccination should proceed in accordance with the national recommendations.</p> <p>Shingrix® should be given with caution to individuals with thrombocytopenia or any coagulation disorder since bleeding may occur following intramuscular administration to these subjects (see Route and method of administration).</p>

² Where an individual has turned 80 years of age following their first dose of Shingrix®, a second dose should be provided to complete the two-dose schedule.

³ Exclusion under this PGD does not necessarily mean the medication is contraindicated, but it would be outside its remit and another form of authorisation will be required.

<p>Action to be taken if the patient is excluded</p>	<p>Individuals who are not of eligible age for the national shingles immunisation programme should be advised when they will become eligible or why they are not eligible for immunisation.</p> <p>Individuals who are in an eligible age group but do not have a clinical contraindication to receiving Zostavax[®], shingles (herpes zoster, live), vaccine should be assessed to receive Zostavax[®]. This PGD does not cover the administration of Zostavax[®].</p> <p>Individuals who have had a confirmed anaphylactic reaction to a previous dose of varicella vaccine or to any component of the vaccine should not be vaccinated unless approved following the specialist advice of an allergist. A Patient Specific Direction would be required.</p> <p>Individuals suffering acute severe febrile illness should postpone immunisation until they have recovered.</p> <p>Individuals who present with a shingles infection with active lesions should postpone immunisation. As individuals eligible for Shingrix[®] are immunocompromised, and therefore at increased risk of recurrent zoster, there is no need to defer Shingrix[®] for a particular pre-determined time frame. Shingrix[®] can be given once any active shingles lesions have resolved.</p> <p>When administration is postponed arrange a future date for vaccination as appropriate, with due consideration of the individual's age to ensure they will meet the inclusion criteria for immunisation. If vaccination cannot be commenced before the individual is 80 years old explain why vaccination will no longer be indicated.</p> <p>The risk to the individual of not being vaccinated must be taken into account.</p> <p>Document the reason for exclusion and any action taken in individual's clinical records.</p> <p>Inform or refer to the GP or a prescriber as appropriate.</p>
<p>Action to be taken if the patient or carer declines treatment</p>	<p>Informed consent, from the individual or a person legally able to act on the individual's behalf, must be obtained prior to administration.</p> <p>Advise the individual/carer about the protective effects of the vaccine, the risks of infection and potential complications.</p> <p>Document advice given and the decision reached.</p> <p>Inform or refer to the GP or a prescriber as appropriate.</p>
<p>Arrangements for referral for medical advice</p>	<p>As per local policy</p>

5. Description of treatment

Name, strength and formulation of drug	<p>Herpes zoster vaccine (recombinant, adjuvanted):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Shingrix[®], powder and suspension for suspension for injection. <p>After reconstitution, one dose (0.5ml) of Shingrix[®] contains varicella zoster virus glycoprotein E antigen 50 micrograms, adjuvanted with AS01_B.</p>
Legal category	<p>Prescription only medicine (POM).</p>
Black triangle ▼	<p>Yes.</p>
Off-label use	<p>Vaccine should be stored according to the conditions detailed in the Storage section below. However, in the event of an inadvertent or unavoidable deviation of these conditions refer to PHE Vaccine Incident Guidance. Where vaccine is assessed in accordance with these guidelines as appropriate for continued use this would constitute off-label administration under this PGD.</p> <p>Where a vaccine is recommended off-label consider, as part of the consent process, informing the individual/carer that the vaccine is being offered in accordance with national guidance but that this is outside the product licence.</p>
Route / method of administration	<p>Shingrix[®] must be reconstituted in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions prior to administration.</p> <p>Following reconstitution, Shingrix[®] vaccine is given by intramuscular injection, preferably in the deltoid region of the upper arm.</p> <p>Subcutaneous administration is not recommended.</p> <p>Maladministration via the subcutaneous route may lead to an increase in transient local reactions.</p> <p>Individuals with bleeding disorders may be vaccinated intramuscularly if, in the opinion of a doctor familiar with the individual's bleeding risk, vaccines or similar small volume intramuscular injections can be administered with reasonable safety by this route. If the individual receives medication/treatment to reduce bleeding, for example treatment for haemophilia, intramuscular vaccination can be scheduled shortly after such medication/treatment is administered. Individuals on stable anticoagulation therapy, including individuals on warfarin who are up to date with their scheduled INR testing and whose latest INR was below the upper threshold of their therapeutic range, can receive intramuscular vaccination. A fine needle (equal to 23 gauge or finer calibre such as 25 gauge) should be used for the vaccination, followed by firm pressure applied to the site (without rubbing) for at least 2 minutes. The individual/carer should be informed about the risk of haematoma from the injection.</p> <p>When administering at the same time as other vaccines care should be taken to ensure that the appropriate route of injection is used for all the vaccinations.</p> <p>The vaccines should be given at separate sites, preferably in different limbs. If given in the same limb, they should be given at</p>

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Route / method of administration (continued)	<p>least 2.5cm apart. The site at which each vaccine was given should be noted in the individual's records.</p> <p>The vaccine should be inspected visually for any foreign particulate matter or variation in appearance prior to reconstitution. If either is observed, do not reconstitute the vaccine.</p> <p>The reconstituted vaccine is an opalescent, colourless to pale brownish liquid. Discard the vaccine if there is any foreign particulate matter and/or variation in appearance.</p> <p>After reconstitution, the vaccine should be used promptly.</p> <p>The SPC for the vaccine provides further guidance on reconstitution and administration.</p>
Dose and frequency of administration	<p>Single 0.5ml dose per administration.</p> <p>Administer a course of two doses with an 8-week interval between doses.</p> <p>If flexibility in the vaccination schedule is necessary, the second dose can be administered between 2 and 6 months after the first dose.</p> <p>If the course is interrupted it should be resumed but not repeated, even if more than 6 months have elapsed since the first dose.</p>
Duration of treatment	<p>A two dose course (see Dose and frequency of administration)</p>
Quantity to be supplied / administered	<p>Single 0.5ml dose per administration.</p>
Supplies	<p>Centrally purchased vaccines for the national immunisation programme can only be ordered via ImmForm and are provided free of charge.</p> <p>Protocols for the ordering, storage and handling of vaccines should be followed to prevent vaccine wastage (see Green Book Chapter 3).</p>
Storage	<p>Store between +2°C to +8°C.</p> <p>Store in original packaging in order to protect from light.</p> <p>Do not freeze.</p> <p>In the event of an inadvertent or unavoidable deviation of these conditions, vaccine that has been stored outside the conditions stated above should be quarantined and risk assessed for suitability of continued off-label use or appropriate disposal. Refer to PHE Vaccine Incident Guidance.</p>
Disposal	<p>Equipment used for immunisation, including used vials, ampoules, or discharged vaccines in a syringe or applicator, should be disposed of safely in a UN-approved puncture-resistant 'sharps' box, according to local authority arrangements and guidance in the technical memorandum 07-01 (Department of Health, 2013).</p>
Drug interactions	<p>See the Additional information section for information on co-administration with other vaccines.</p> <p>A detailed list of drug interactions is available in the SPC.</p>

Identification and management of adverse reactions	<p>The most common adverse reactions observed after administration of Shingrix® are pain at the injection site, myalgia, fatigue and headache. Most of these reactions were not long-lasting (median duration of 2 to 3 days). Other relatively common reactions include injection site reactions (including pain, redness, swelling and/or pruritis), gastrointestinal symptoms (including nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea and/or abdominal pain), chills and fever.</p> <p>A detailed list of adverse reactions is available in the SPC.</p>
Reporting procedure of adverse reactions	<p>As with all vaccines, healthcare professionals and individuals/carers are encouraged to report suspected adverse reactions to the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) using the Yellow Card reporting scheme or search for MHRA Yellow Card in the Google Play or Apple App Store.</p> <p>Any adverse reaction to the vaccine should be documented in the individual's record and the individual's GP should be informed.</p>
Written information to be given to patient or carer	<p>Offer marketing authorisation holder's patient information leaflet (PIL) provided with the vaccine.</p>
Patient advice / follow up treatment	<p>Inform the individual/carer of possible side effects and their management.</p> <p>Give advice regarding normal reaction to the injection, for example pain at the injection site.</p> <p>The individual/carer should be advised to seek medical advice in the event of a severe adverse reaction.</p> <p>When administration is postponed advise the individual when to return for vaccination with due consideration of the individual's age to ensure they will meet the inclusion criteria for immunisation. If vaccination cannot be commenced before the individual is 80 years old explain why vaccination will no longer be indicated.</p>
Special considerations / additional information Continued over page	<p>Ensure there is immediate access to adrenaline (epinephrine) 1 in 1000 injection and easy access to a telephone at the time of vaccination.</p> <p>Shingrix® can be given at the same time as unadjuvanted inactivated influenza vaccine, 23-valent pneumococcal vaccine (PPV23) or reduced antigen diphtheria-tetanus-acellular pertussis (dTaP). The vaccines should be administered at different injection sites. The adverse reactions of fever and shivering were more frequent when PPV23 vaccine is co-administered with Shingrix®.</p> <p>Because of the absence of data on co-administration of Shingrix® vaccine with adjuvanted influenza vaccine, it should not be routine to offer appointments to give this vaccine at the same time as the adjuvanted influenza vaccine. Based on current information, scheduling should ideally be separated by an interval of at least 7 days to avoid incorrect attribution of potential adverse events. Where individuals attend requiring both vaccines, however, and require rapid protection or are considered likely to be lost to follow up, co-administration may still be considered.</p> <p>Immunisation with Shingrix® should ideally be delayed for seven days after COVID-19 vaccination and vice versa. Neither vaccine has been tested for routine co-administration; there is potential for</p>

<p>Special considerations / additional information (continued)</p>	<p>the side effects of Shingrix® to be confused with those of COVID-19 vaccines. Where individuals attend requiring both vaccines, however, and require rapid protection or are considered likely to be lost to follow up, co-administration may still be considered.</p> <p>As Shingrix® is an inactivated vaccine, where individuals in an eligible cohort present having received another inactivated or live vaccine, Shingrix® vaccination should still be considered. In most cases, vaccination should proceed to avoid any further delay in protection and to avoid the risk of the patient not returning for a later appointment. In such circumstances, patients should be informed about the likely timing of potential adverse events relating to each vaccine.</p>
<p>Record</p>	<p>Record:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • that valid informed consent was given • name of individual, address, date of birth and GP with whom the individual is registered • name of immuniser • name and brand of vaccine • date of administration • dose, form and route of administration of vaccine • quantity administered • batch number and expiry date • anatomical site of vaccination • advice given, including advice given if excluded or declines immunisation • details of any adverse drug reactions and actions taken • supplied via PGD <p>Records should be signed and dated (or a password-controlled immuniser's record on e-records).</p> <p>All records should be clear, legible and contemporaneous.</p> <p>This information should be recorded in the individual's GP record and any other appropriate medical records, such as care or nursing records.</p> <p>A record of all individuals receiving treatment under this PGD should also be kept for audit purposes in accordance with local policy.</p>
